Lunch selection - Parent Pay

If you have not already done so, please can we urge you to register and use Parent Pay in order to pre select your child's lunch choice. Using Parent Pay is a quick and easy way to make payments, sign up for clubs, and pre order lunch for the day. By doing this, it makes sure that the kitchen prepare the correct quantities of food, eliminate waste and make sure your child can always have their first choice of meal options. At the moment, we are finding that a lot of children have not had their meals ordered, which means the staff are having to do it first thing in the morning. This impacts on lessons and learning as it then takes time to go through the children. Please can we ask you to use the site to pre order meals for the day/week (before 8.00am). If you need any support using the site, please call in to the office and Angie will be glad to help you. Thank you.

Teaching for Creativity

Last year we embarked on a three year journey as part of a collaborative group of schools looking at Teaching Creative Learning habits. The project is underpinned by the work of Professor Bill Lucas and his research into the dispositions or behaviours that employers are most actively seeking. This research has led to the development of the Learning Behaviours wheel, with the key habits being identified as: Inquisitive, Imaginative, Collaborative, Disciplined, Persistent. The staff at St Joseph's are undertaking further reading and research to learn about how to incorporate these behaviours into day to day lessons. It is exciting work and will take our curriculum to the next level! We are starting with a focus on the key learning habit of 'Collaborative' so please do talk to your children about this over the coming months and see their understanding and articulation of why this is a vital 21st Century skill develop! More to come so watch this space!



Attendance and Punctuality

As you will be aware, we have been raising awareness of attendance and punctuality constantly over the last two years as our figures have been heading in the wrong direction. Our whole school attendance figures have been declining, and the number of children classed as 'Persistently Absent' (attendance of below 90%) has been rising. Last year the Government released further documentation - 'Working together to improve school attendance' (Dfe 2022), giving further direction and guidance regarding school attendance. We really do want to work with parents to understand the barriers to good attendance, and support where we can. However, the message is clear-that school attendance is important, and the impact of frequently missing school is detrimental to future life chances. We will continue to monitor. analyse, report, support and challenge where attendance is a concern, and will be working closely with our Educational Welfare Officer to improve our figures. The term got off to a good start, but has been declining over the weeks, with the whole school figure being 95% (below our target of at least 96%) and Persistent Absence being 18% (which is far too high). We are also noticing an increase in the number of children arriving late, missing their line and entering through the office. We would like to remind you that the morning whistle goes at 8.45am and the children need to be lined up and walking in with their class at 8.50am.

Recognising processing difficulties and understanding the impact on your child's learning and strategies to support your child.

Both sessions will take place at school with refreshments provided! We will send out a further letter for you to sign up, with both sessions being really practical and informative, so we do hope we get a good uptake.

Also a reminder we are closed to pupils on Friday 21st October. It is then half term week and we open to pupils Monday 31st October.
