Whole School Attendance

Our whole school attendance from September to date is 95%. This is a drop from our usual average, and falls below the Government expectation of at least 96%. We will continue to work on attendance and any underlying issues next term, but please support us and your child by ensuring regular and punctual attendance. Thank you.

Thought for the term....

Under the School Teachers' Pay and Conditions document, set out by the Department for Education, all teachers are to be provided with a 10% portion of their working week as 'non-contact' time i.e not teaching. This time is ring fenced for Planning, Preparation and Assessment, and is therefore known as PPA time. This PPA time was introduced in 2005 in a response to the increased workload and pressures placed on teaching staff. We are now in Advent – a time of preparation for the coming of our Lord. There is no doubt that the increased pressures and workload felt by teachers is mirrored in all walks of society, not least of all in the run up to Christmas with the presents and shopping and cooking and decorating. Perhaps we could all do with some PPA time! Maybe take 10% of our week and use it to Plan, Prepare and Assess. That way, the planning can still



cover the necessary requirements pertaining to Christmas and the inevitable sprout peeling and turkey basting, but still leaves room for the Preparation – steadying our hearts and minds for this most wonderful experience, and the Assess – reflecting on what we are doing well and what we could do better when living our lives in keeping with the example set by this special baby.
