<u>Behaviour</u>

There are lots of things I am proud of in this school, and I must say that behaviour is up there. We honestly are privileged to have such wonderful, amazing, polite and kind children. I have an email file of feedback from visitors to our school, who always praise the children for their high levels of conduct, manners, politeness and good behaviour. I really do think it is a strong point of ours.

However..... like everything, there is always room for improvement. I would say this is especially true with something like behaviour which is potentially very subjective - if your child comes home with accounts of

poor behaviour etc, that is potentially the lens through which you would view the whole school. I want to stress that I place a great deal of value in good levels of behaviour, manners, politeness and conduct, and I want to make one thing absolutely crystal clear - I will not tolerate bullying in this school. However, again, definitions of bullying can sometimes become blurred and there is always a question of when do 'expected playground' issues cross the line and become bullying? We are working with young children who need support in understanding consequences and right from wrong.

So this year, I would like to undertake some work to look at behaviour at St Joseph's and review our systems, actions and structures. We have already begun by completing some initial surveys with the children to establish their view of the school. Over the coming months I will be asking you, as parents, for feedback and conducting some additional research.

Coming up - Curriculum!!

One of the big school action targets for this year is to look at our curriculum design. We want our curriculum to be engaging, inspiring, challenging and appropriate so that it meets the needs of St Joseph's children and gives them the skills, knowledge and understanding they need to to make a positive difference to a 21st Century World (so no small task!) Staff are looking at each subject and looking at ways to develop them. Coming up in Term 2, staff are implementing a new English scheme called 'Pathways to Writing' - this puts quality texts at the heart of the lessons and all English work comes from there. A lot of the texts are 'picture books' as research has found that this allows children to access with a 'low entry, high ceiling' approach. We are sure the Pathways work will have a dramatic impact on the teaching of English.

Then later on in the term, staff are receiving training on Teaching Maths to Mastery. This will be driven by a scheme called 'Maths No Problem' which takes its approach from Singapore methods of teaching Mathematics (Singapore always comes out top in international studies of school performance). As the year progresses, we will be further implementing this approach. We will keep you informed of the process and hope to be able to offer some parent sessions to explain this quite different approach to the teaching of mathematics.
