# Reading - our approach

Over the course of this year, we have had a big focus on reading at St Joseph's. This has included implementing a new scheme for the teaching of phonics (Read, Write, Inc), a new scheme for Reading lessons and comprehension in Years 2-6 (Pathways to Read), and a big push on promoting reading for pleasure. On top of that, Mrs Burley has been working hard with reading ambassadors, organising class libraries, and launching our 'Reading Rocks' pupil magazine. We are also extremely grateful to the PTA for making a very generous donation to allow us to purchase additional books for class libraries, and to all the parents who kindly donated books to us. What a busy year it has been! However, it is paying dividends and we are most definitely a 'reading school'.

- At St Joseph's we believe that reading is a gateway to the world!

  We promote a positive attitude towards reading, a love of literature and hope to instil a lifelong passion for reading in your children. The use of carefully selected class texts for each year group will provide the stimulus for the majority of lessons as well as giving the children the opportunity for Reading for Pleasure. Our aim is to establish each child as a lifetime reader.
- At St Joseph's we prioritise reading to allow all pupils to access our curriculum. Our wider curriculum stems from core texts read with the children each half term, and each subject is linked where possible to the themes encountered within that text. As a result, we approach the teaching of reading from all angles, so as to miss no opportunity to spark a child's interest. Our rigorous and sequential approach to our reading curriculum develops pupils' fluency, confidence and enjoyment in reading. Choral reading plays a major part in all learning maximising the amount of purposeful reading experienced by every child, every day. Our approach is, 'Read wherever possible.'

Story has always been the ultimate teaching vehicle. Whether it be in the form of a parable to explore right and wrong, a story problem to launch a maths lesson or the exploration of a deep theme through a powerful text, we use story to make learning, and life, meaningful.

We hope you agree with our philosophy of the importance of reading, and we hope that over this year, the children have talked to you at home about the books they are reading, the texts they have studied and the themes they have explored. Our internal assessments have shown us the impact our new approach to phonics delivery has had, and we hope you can see this in your own child when they read with you at home. Thank you for continuing to support us in our mission to make every child a reader. To help us succeed, please do read with your child at home - encourage them to read often, and expose them to a wide variety of texts. Please can we ask that books bags are returned to school each day, so that we can continue lessons, swap texts and monitor all the fantastic things they are reading with you at home. Thank you.

### **Curriculum Information**

On the same note as curriculum, I would just like to draw your attention to the curriculum section of our website. A recent parent survey for Religious Education and Catholic Life highlighted that some parents don't feel well informed about the programme of study for RE, and previous surveys have mentioned similar in other subjects. ### IMPORTANT - SUN CREAM ALLERGY INFORMATION

We CANNOT apply suncream to children. It has also been brought to our attention that some brands of suncream (Nivea for example) contain traces of nut products, and as you are aware, we have several children with serious nut allergies. Therefore we request that suncream is not brought into school, and if you do apply suncream to your child, choose a product with a long lasting SPF. Thank you.

## **Attendance and Punctuality**

This term, we implemented our new morning system for entering school in the morning. Responses from parents, staff and children have been very positive, and the day now starts in a calm and orderly manner, with the same expectations as at other times of the day.

We have noticed a dramatic improvement in levels of punctuality, but there is still room for improvement with several children each day arriving late. This is being monitored and logged and parents will be notified. The start of the school day is very important, in terms of lessons covered, which are often vital core skills such as arithmetic, times table work, spelling and grammar etc, but also from a social and emotional aspect. We as adults don't like walking into a meeting late and can feel quite exposed; it is the same with children. So please, ensure that all children enter at 8.50 with their friends, rather than have to walk in by themselves once lessons have started.

We also continue to work on attendance. Our whole school figure for the year to date is 92.7%, which is below our target of at least 96%, and we still have far too many children with below 90% attendance. We will continue to tackle this in the coming half term.
